

Declaration of Independence, Bill of Rights, The Constitution, and The Federalist Papers Class was presented by one of our members, a professor who taught a lengthier version of this class at IUSB & PNC. - The zoo staff presented 27 off-site and on grounds formal education presentations

- The zoo opened for our 90th season on April 1st
- The zoo participated in the Indiana Tourism Bureau's "Wild Indiana Week" promotion
- The Zoo Society held a student art auction at the Uptown Art Space for this year's Zoobilee fundraiser

♦ Capital Improvements and General Updates

April

- The construction of the new Fallow Deer and American Crow/Turkey Vulture habitats were completed, and the animals were successfully moved in
- Work immediately started on the old Fallow Deer exhibit space to create an African Sulcata Tortoise habitat attached to the old Deer Barn and to use the yard space to expand the neighboring Grant Zebra exhibit.

May

- All the first stage projects for the new Sulcata Tortoise and Grant Zebra renovations have been completed, so the animals have been moved in for the season. Stage 2 will take place in the Fall when the season slows down.
- With the support of a Unity Foundation grant, we were able to install six can, bottle and paper recycling containers around the zoo including one near the exit gate for the zoo maps

June

A new fiberglass lion head drinking fountain was installed in its original 1960's – 1990's location near the Red Barn yard and the Jungle Building.

 New Generac generators were purchased with a donation from the Zack Trust and installed onto the Jungle Building, Castle and winter holding buildings by Current Electric
